

#8: Old Osage Hotel (145 Main Street)

The hotel was owned by Elbert & Mae Hughes Edwards in the 1920's and sold to Agnes West around the start of World War II.

It was in 1934 that Harry S. Truman received a long distance call while staying at the Osage Hotel inquiring if he would consider being a candidate for United States Senate. The callers were Tom Pendergast and Jim Aylward, State Chairman of the Democrat Party in Missouri. Truman later said, "I was too astounded to give them an answer until the next day." One could say that Truman's major political career that led to the presidency, had its start at the Osage Hotel in Warsaw, only a mile away from the dam that bears his name. The hotel was completely transformed beginning in 2008 into a unique place to eat featuring artistic craftsmanship, wholesome food and a beautiful view of the Osage.

The hotel was earlier named The Central Hotel.
